A Selection of Late March to Early April Blooms in the Edith J. Carrier Arboretum

Spring is the time when there's warmth, moisture, and sunlight on the forest floor. A *spring ephemeral* is a plant that completes its entire life cycle in the spring, sending up flowers and setting seeds before dying back to the ground. The plant remains dormant, roots resting underground, until the following spring.



Foamflower Tiarella cordifolia

Native to eastern North America

It spreads by rhizomes underground. It's flower lasts up to 6 weeks, longer than most of the spring blooms.



Siberian Squill Scilla siberica

Native to the Caucasus Mountains

This plant is in the asparagus family, but it is toxic to people. It also spreads aggressively.



Squirrel Corn Dicentra canadensis

Native to eastern North America

Like many spring ephemerals, its seeds are transported by ants who are attracted to the oily elaiosomes.



Toad Trillium Trillium cuneatum

Native to eastern United States

Also called toadshade or "bloody butchers" for the unpleasant odor of the flower. Tri-lliums have three leaves, three petals, and three sepals.



Trout Lily *Erythronium americanum*

Native to eastern United States Named after its mottled brown leaves.











Native to eastern United States

Dicentra means twice-spurred for the two protrusions on the top of the flower. The small petals at the bottom represent the "blood" of the name.

Wild Ginger Asarum canadense

Native to eastern North America

These flowers are generally under the heart-shaped leaves of this groundcover.

Dutchman's Breeches Dicentra cucullaria

Native to eastern United States

Bumblebees are the best pollinator for this flower because they have a long proboscis that can reach all the way in to the top of the flower.

Siberian Bugloss Brunnera macrophylla

Native to the Caucasus Mountains into Siberia Same family (borage) as Virginia Bluebells. The leaves resist animal damage because they are very rough.



Eastern Round-leaved Violet Viola rotundifolia

Native to eastern North America

The leaves and flowers are on separate stalks.

Early Flowering Trees and Shrubs



Flowering Dogwood *Cornus florida*

Native to eastern North America

The dogwood is the state tree of Virginia. The white "petals" are actually sepals, while the yellow interior is the flower.



Red maple Acer rubrum

Native to eastern North America In general, some maples produce the pollen-bearing flowers and some trees produce the samaras (seeds), but sometimes the same tree will do both.





Saucer Magnolia Magnolia x soulangeana

A hybrid of two magnolias native to China.

The flowers emerge before the large leaves appear.

Eastern Redbud Cercis canadensis

Native to eastern North America

Redbud is in the legume family, and the blossoms are edible. Chickadees and some other songbirds eat the seeds.
