
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## **CHBS Highlights**

#### **CHBS Leadership Training**

Forty-five formal and informal college leaders participated in the **Supporting Diverse Learners in the Modern Classroom** three-hour training conducted by Emily Helft of Landmark College. "The college for students who learn differently" is Landmark's tagline and the school focuses on and conducts research about students with executive function challenges, or who identify with dyslexia, autism, or ADHD. The purpose of this training was to facilitate leader knowledge so these leaders may better support faculty, staff, and students. There is greater variation in neurodiversity than addressed at the training.



Finding language and people to talk with about concerns related to neurodiversity without condemnation can be difficult. This is an expansive field where it is easy to misunderstand, judge others, and respond based on popular myths. The challenges of individuals with neurodivergent concerns are often life long, even with interventions. Helping individuals gain processes and systems can help them to understand themselves and learn to appreciate their uniqueness. Through routine and the application of strategies individuals may be better able to manage their concerns, and gain feelings of success. There are high functioning and very successful peers who

could classify themselves among the neurodivergent, not just our students.

A post-session survey showed that eighty-nine percent of attendees found the session very useful to extremely useful and all participants completing the evaluation found it relevant to their leadership. The training was fast paced, covering transitions in language related to how we refer to people impacted by neurodiversity, how diverse all brains are, clarification of terms, major categories under neurodivergence, and many strategies such as the use of gnat charts, concept maps, or 100-point rubrics for grading. Another popular strategy involved breaking complex assignments with many steps down to smaller projects. The discussion regarding

cognitive load related to students' "power bank" and how to put assignments together better were frequent highlights mentioned.

Any of these character representations could be in our classes and we might see them as unique. They represent mostly male and all racial identities. Men are more often diagnosed when females are often misdiagnosed. Females tend to internalize becoming more anxious or try to camouflage/mask their traits. Males may externalize with horseplay or being disruptive in the classroom. Neurodivergent traits may present differently across gender identities. Some research finds that a greater percent of members across the LGBTQ spectrum may be neurodivergent.



The great thing about this year is that we are uncloaking the hidden by asking everyone to learn about this population making up about 30% of all students. Our goal is to focus on how to help every student have a sense of belonging and help students or co-workers to succeed out of the darkness. Dr. Brené Brown researches vulnerability, guilt, and shame. Our capacity to relieve shame with light is essential to increasing the message that students and peers belong among us and that we all struggle at some point. Perfection is a myth we are often asked to believe. The message that our diverse students or peers are defective beyond repair is never a positive thing as we all need hope and help at some point. Perhaps this short clip might make the message clearer as to why collectively working on this issue will help so many let go of the shame related to their uniqueness.

Universal design is one active strategy we are using to make course content more accessible. You may go to the university website or sign up for the LAUD training. Our neurodiversity training sessions are still open.

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## Recognizing Latinas Economic Contributions



Recent research highlighted the \$1.3 Trillion contribution of Latinas to the nation's GDP illustrating that this is as much as the GDP of the state of Florida. "Latinas outpace their gender and ethnic peers in key economic measures, including record levels of Latina workforce participation, educational attainment, and income growth." While there is advancement of Latinas to higher ranked positions, there remains a large wage gap. As we look at the <u>economic realities of Latinas</u>, we see older immigrant Latinas aging out of the workforce and being replaced by their U.S. born daughters and granddaughters as bilingual professionals with high levels of education.

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### **ODS Updates**



Please welcome Brittany Dioszeghy as the new Office of Disability Services (ODS) Director. Brittany served as the Assistant Director for over ten years at ODS and brings that experience to the position. Faculty should be aware that student requests for ODS accommodations are still occurring as students gather and submit appropriate documentation. Faculty should refresh their knowledge about the testing guidelines for accommodations, that would include getting exams to ODS in a timely manner to prevent additional stress for students and staff. Please remember to use the Accommodate system in working with students to arrange test proctoring needs and have students start early as accommodation space can be a challenge during high need times such as mid-terms and finals. The testing space

on the top floor of Madison Union is no longer available; however, space at the testing center is available. CHBS faculty should be aware that we are the highest user of ODS testing accommodations. These processes are difficult for our larger classes. Student learning and testing accommodations are determined by ODS as part of our legal mandate.

Faculty are learning newer universal design processes of assessment that expand traditional timed objective questions, short answer, or long essays. Instructors may better define the test purpose and approach rather than assuming this is widely understood by students; some refer to this as testing with a purpose. Consider item design and length. Instructions worry about cheating, especially with the emergence of AI and other technology. Using the Canvas testing feature can allow you to build a testing question bank, randomly select a number of questions and assign students to various testing times based on their accommodations. Some instructors talk about what is learning and engage students in how they learn best and show what they have learned better. Universal design does not replace legal accommodations, but we can help students better manage their process. This is introduced in the Assessment section of the <u>LAUD Canvas</u> site.

ODS will provide additional evening hours in the Testing Center Monday – Thursday for students who have evening classes. A three business day notice is required. If you are new to JMU you may find out more from the <u>Accommodation Faculty Guide</u>. Faculty can learn whether a student has an ODS accommodation through the Accommodate system on MyMadison. Faculty should sign off on receiving student accommodation notices. It is not unusual that some students are still in process. If you need assistance, please talk your AUH and reach out to ODS for additional assistance.
