# **Staff Invited to Participate**

Many CHBS staff (and faculty) are front-facing with students and community members representing the JMU "we care" brand. When students are struggling, they may be at your desk trying to communicate that they need assistance in a way you may not recognize. When we are frustrated, our communication skills are not the best either. Individuals with less awareness of neurodiversity may respond negatively to these attempts. A simple way to think about students who may fall into the neurodiversity populations is that their brains simply function differently.

#### **Title IX New Rules**

Have you considered how Title IX of the Education Amendments Act of 1972 implicitly protects pregnancy? It always has, and parenting students, too. The US Department of Education issued new regulations focusing on the rights of pregnant and parenting students and to make colleges and universities more responsive and accessible for this population. More than 180,000 students experience pregnancy every semester. The 2020 National Postsecondary Student Aid Study estimated that 107,000 female undergraduate students and more than 35,000 graduate students were enrolled in higher education while pregnant. What was their experience?

JMU's new Title IX Director, Laura Sider Jost, will highlight new information while providing updates at our upcoming faculty training (see below). Faculty are encouraged to contact her if they have any concerns about Title IX in their faculty role. The director served under JMU's previous Title IX Coordinator, Amy Sirocky Meck, who left over the summer. CHBS staff can anticipate a Title IX update training this semester.

# **Hispanic Heritage Month begins**

September 15 – October 15

The 2024 theme is "Pioneers of Change: Shaping the Future Together," which encapsulates the "spirit of innovation, resilience, and unity that define the Hispanic experience." September 15<sup>th</sup> was selected because it coincides with the Independence Day celebrations of Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua. Later Mexico, Belize, and Chile declared their independence during that time period. Let us continue to learn about Hispanic/Latinx culture and introduce their contributions within our professions or areas of engagement to our students. Here are some quick questions with answers at the end of this Canopy:



- What Congressman first introduced the idea of Hispanic Heritage Month?
- What year did Congress pass its observance?
- What USA president issued the first Hispanic Week Observance? Hispanic month?
- How many Hispanic faculty members do we have in CHBS?

According to the Virginia government, Hispanics comprise 10.6% of the state's population, with 56% being U.S. born. Harrisonburg's Hispanic population is 20.8%. Check out <u>Virginia's Noteworthy Hispanic</u> People; included is Isabel Castillo, a Harrisonburg High School and local advocate.

More Hispanic/Latinx students may arrive at JMU and within our college. JMU reported just over 7% of students identifying as Hispanic (2022). You can see <a href="trends">trends</a> from 2015-2023. To foster a sense of belonging

where every member of the CHBS can thrive, let us acknowledge, recognize, and use the resources available to our Hispanic/Latinx students.



Remember to support local community service agencies like the <u>Futuro Latino Coalition</u> or <u>Shenandoah Valley Migrant Education Program</u> both are part of IIHHS in the Campbell Building. On-campus are the <u>Latin American</u>, <u>Latinx and Caribbean Studies</u> student organization and the <u>Latino Community Engagement</u> minor. <u>Madison Hispanic Caucus</u> offers mentoring. <u>Scholars Latino Initiative</u> (SLI) is also supported locally. <u>Celebrate</u> our local Hispanic business community.

#### **New Funding**

The Division of Diversity, Equity & Inclusion has established a dedicated **DEIAB Innovation Fund** to support projects that advance an innovative approach to DEIAB at JMU and serves to encourage campus-wide efforts that promote, enhance, and celebrate diversity, equity, inclusion, accessibility, and belonging (DEIAB). Selected grants will be funded between \$500 and \$1,000.

Students, staff, and faculty are eligible to apply. Requests of up to \$2,000 may be considered under unique circumstances. The first *deadline to apply is October 6, 2024*; funds are available upon approval of the application and are to be expensed by May 30, 2025.
