Members had mixed opinions about having lectures and presentations available through Zoom.


In addition to addressing our questions, many members made wonderful suggestions for interest groups, outings, and luncheon locations. The Board will (gratefully) discuss these suggestions.


FEA Spring Survey Results


Currently we usually have two outings a year. Below is a list of possible outings for the future. Please indicate your level of interest in each of the following suggestion and/or suggest additional outings.

President Jonathan Alger Steps Down

Charlie King Named Interim President

President Jonathan Alger recently announced that he will be leaving JMU after the conclusion of this academic year to accept the presidency at American University in Washington, D.C., effective July 1, 2024.

Mr. Alger has served as JMU president for 12 years, during which time the university has grown and evolved into a nationally recognized, student-centered research university. During his tenure at JMU, President Alger has been a great friend to the FEA. Twice he agreed to raise his contribution to our Legacy Grant Award and he has hosted receptions for faculty emeriti, both at his home and on campus. He will be missed.

"President Alger elevated the university to a place far beyond where JMU has ever been. Under his leadership, we have turned the page into the next chapter of the history of JMU," said Maribeth Herod, Board of Visitors rector. "JMU is no longer the hidden gem in the mountains because Jon has led us to national prominence and is leaving the university after accomplishing so much. Jon is leaving the university in an incredible place, with capable leadership throughout."

Throughout his tenure at JMU, President Alger has been a prominent leader in higher education across the nation and world. He's been an active presence on and off campus, as well as on many national, state, and regional boards and committees. He co-taught a leadership seminar in the Honors College for a number of years and has guest-taught in many other classes. He has represented JMU on numerous national boards and received the American Council on Education Council of Fellows/Fidelity Investments Mentor Award in 2021 and the ALL IN Campus Democracy Challenge Standout Campus President Award in 2019.

At the April Board of Visitors' meeting, the Executive Committee of the Board of Visitors named former Senior Vice President of Administration and Finance, Charlie King, as the interim president.

"Charlie King is uniquely qualified to serve as interim president given his 25-year career at JMU and is someone who has also proven to be a proficient leader on campus, in Richmond and within our local community," said Board of Visitors Rector Maribeth Herod. "This decision was thoughtful and done with great confidence knowing there will be a seamless transition of the university's operations into Charlie's leadership. Just as importantly, his established relationships, knowledge of the institution and desire to continue JMU's upward trajectory will aid greatly upon arrival of the new, incoming president."

"Having the opportunity to come back to the university I care so deeply about is a great honor," said King. "I look forward to supporting JMU during each phase of this transition and am eager to be back on campus." While King will begin his interim position on July 1, 2024, he will be working through a transition period where he and Alger will work together prior to Alger moving to American University.

King said that he sees his interim president role as keeping the train on schedule while the board hires a new president. King will serve as interim president until June 30, 2025, or until a new president has been hired and completes their transition.

"It's great to have Charlie back at the university," said Alger.

The Board has begun executing the search process for the next JMU president; additional information will be shared as this process advances.

2024 Faculty Emeriti Legacy Grant

The Legacy Award (now \$5,000) has been awarded to a full-time tenured faculty member every year since 2004. The award rotates among the colleges and the recipient is chosen by the Dean's office. This year's recipient, from the College of Mathematics and Sciences is one of our contemporaries, Dr, Tom DeVore, Professor of Chemistry.

Tom came to JMU in 1977 (!). He has been an active scholar for over 40 years, publishing 86 articles and bringing in over \$700,000 in support of his program. His devotion to students has been inspiring. Early in his career, Tom was instrumental in developing a program to involve undergraduates in hands-on research. He has continued this practice throughout his more than 40 years at JMU, mentoring 113 students. In fact, when he learned of the award, he immediately expressed a desire to use the money to help further student research. Tom was also instrumental in bringing the Shenandoah Valley Regional Science Fair to JMU allowing high school students to showcase their research in a university setting.

Tom has been an active member of the Virginia Academy of Sciences and the Virginia Section of the American Chemical Society. He has served in leadership roles in both organizations; and is a fellow of the Virgnia Academy of Sciences.

Dr. Shiree Harbick, Clinical Educator, Researcher, and Director of the Facilitating Infant Responsiveness to Stimulate Talking (FIRST) Program in Communication Sciences and Disorders, served as our Fall 2023 Lecture Series speaker. Shiree's research addresses parent-infant communication in 6- to 12-month-olds, with a particular focus on encouraging parents from lowincome, low-resource, and other at-risk (e.g., new immigrant) circumstances to "tune in, talk to, and take turns" with their babies long before they're producing words. To date, Shiree and a staff of JMU speech-language pathology professionals and volunteers, have supported more than 85 graduate and 120 undergraduate students over six years in coaching facilitative communication patterns in the JMU Speech and Language Clinic, at area daycare centers, and local churches. We are proud of Shiree's ongoing work and appreciate her presentation to the small, but highly engaged audience.
