For several years, the FEA has had active interest groups with robust membership, and we are always interested in starting new groups that reflect the interests of our members. These groups provide an informal atmosphere for emeriti faculty to gather and socialize. The Breakfast Group meets the second Wednesday of each month at 9 am at Hotel Madison.

The Lunch Group meets monthly (except in August and December) at 11:30 at a local restaurant. We rotate through the weekdays to accommodate members who have obligations on particular days. We generally have around 20 members in attendance, and spouses and guests are always welcome.

The Dinner Group meets every other month with the usual exception of August and December. Group members host the lively potluck dinners.

The Beer and Cider Group meets every couple of months at various locations breweries, beer shops, bars, restaurants and members' homes—to taste a variety of beers and hard ciders, and to enjoy the camaraderie.

FEA LEGACY GRANT

Initiated in 2004, this grant is awarded annually to a deserving full-time, tenured Faculty member. It rotates among the University's colleges and may be used for any purpose to further the recipient's professional development or to enhance their instruction.

Congratulations to our fifteenth recipient, Dr. Katey Castellano, Professor of English. Dr. Castellano holds a PhD in English from Duke University. Since arriving at JMU in 2006, she has published The Ecology of British Romantic Conservatism, 1790-1837 as well as 10 peer reviewed articles. Her teaching portfolio includes a wide variety of courses including Literature and the Anthropocene, Cli-Fi: Climate Change in Fiction, Mary Shelley and her Circle and Wildlife Encounters in Literature. Her impressive vita also includes Research Presentations, Grants & Awards as well as Service to her Profession and the University.

Funds from the grant will provide research time and travel funds to examine and analyze pamphlets published by Robert Wedderburn, a freed slave, found in the Senate House Library, and the British Library in London. His rare pamphlets advocate for solidarity between the English working class and enslaved people in the West Indies as it relates to cooperatively maintained commons.

Dr. Castellano will share information on her research with us at the Spring Luncheon in April.

JMU VALLEY SCHOLARS

Initiated by President Jonathan Alger in 2014, the Valley Scholars Program serves first-generation financially eligible students from area school districts. Beginning in eighth grade, Valley Scholars can earn scholarships if they persist with the program and qualify for admission to JMU.

Congratulations to the program's first class! Twenty-six of the 32 members entered JMU as freshmen in August. The remaining scholars are attending other colleges and universities in Virginia. What a fabulous program we have chosen to support!

During the period between June through August, 2019 we totaled \$2,585 in donations. Thanks!
