## 2023 TRANSFER STUDENT SURVEY

PRELIMINARY DATA BRIEF



## **Transfer Student Survey (TSS)**

To gain a better understanding of the incoming transfer students and their needs, the Office of Planning, Analytics & Institutional Research (PAIR) administers the Transfer Student Survey (TSS) to all incoming students transferring from another institution. Survey responses were gathered between March 2023 and August 2023. Students receive a link to complete the First Year Survey as part of the OneBook process through orientation. There was a total of 564 responses (78.3% response rate<sup>1</sup>).

This brief provides preliminary data to a sample of questions from the TSS focusing on sense of belonging and student characteristics. Final data will be available in January 2024 after official university demographic data are finalized.

## **Preliminary Summary of Findings**

➤ The majority of transfer students are coming from Community Colleges in Virginia. One third (33%) expect to come into JMU with a transferable Associate's Degree from the original institution.





Fig. 1 Where are Transfer Students Coming From?



> Overall, the majority of transfer students feel they belong at JMU.



> The majority of transfer students have a vocational or social philosophy of education.

Fig. 3 Philosophy of Education




**Vocational philosophy:** Education is primarily a preparation for an occupational future. Social, intellectual and extracurricular activities are less important.

**Social philosophy:** Extracurricular activities, group parties, athletics, social life, rewarding friendships and loyalty to college traditions are emphasized and are viewed as important and necessary for the cultivation of the well-rounded person.

> Slightly less than half of transfer students are interested in purposing graduate/professional degrees after their undergraduate education. Of note, nearly 60% of incoming first year students indicated interest in purposing a graduate degree or postgraduate training.

45% of incoming transfer students indicate wanting to pursue a graduate degree.
