In compliance with the "Timely Notice" provisions of the federal *Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act of 1998* the James Madison University Police Department is giving notice of an alleged robbery reported by the Harrisonburg Police Department on Tuesday, February 07, 2012.

The Harrisonburg Police Department is looking for two suspects, who are responsible for a robbery that occurred last night. The victim reported to police that around 10 p.m. a known male and a male acquaintance came to his residence in the 1100 block of Mountain View Drive.

The offenders were inside of the residence when they demanded money from the victim. During the robbery one male claimed to have a firearm; however, a gun was never shown.

One offender has been identified and police are working to identify the second offender, who is described as a black male in his late 20's.

Charges have not yet been placed.

Anyone with information leading to the arrest of either suspect is asked to call Crime Solvers. Tipsters may text "HPD" plus their tip to CRIMES (274637) or call 574.5050. Crime Solvers is an anonymous tip line and callers could receive up to a \$1,000 reward. Close and lock all exterior doors and windows at night and anytime the area is left unattended whether it be for 5 minutes or 5 days to go to class, go to the store, visit a friend or leave town for the holiday. Be particularly cautious about leaving ground level doors and windows unsecured and even individual room and office doors in complexes where multiple occupants have access to common areas inside the perimeter of the residential, administrative and academic facilities. This warning also extends to vehicles. Car windows should be up, car doors should be locked and valuable contents should be secured out of sight.
